

TURKEY CALLS OUT RESERVES.

Revolt in Macedonia Feared—Even Foreigners Forbidden Leave to Towns They Live in Without Permit.

LONDON, Feb. 11.—A Constantinople despatch says an order has been issued calling out the reserves.

There are many rumored reasons for this action, the most likely being an outbreak at Monastir, in Macedonia. There are fears of a revolt in Macedonia.

Orders have been sent throughout the empire that neither foreigners nor natives be permitted to leave the towns in which they reside without special leave from Constantinople.

The Porte has officially informed the foreign embassies that twenty-one out of the fifty-three Armenians tried at Erzinghan for the murder of Mussulmans have been condemned to death. It is believed, however, that the death sentence will be commuted to imprisonment for life.

QUAINT ARMENIAN SERVICES.

In Costly Vestments a Native Priest Proclaims the Story of His Country's Dire Wrongs.

Three hundred Armenians, representing about one-third of the entire Armenian population of this city, attended the celebration of high mass yesterday afternoon in St. Chrysostom's Chapel of Trinity parish, at Seventh avenue and Thirty-ninth street. The service was celebrated by the Rev. Dr. Derounian, of Worcester, Mass., who was invited to hold services on behalf of the Armenians slaughtered recently by Turkish soldiers.

It was an impressive celebration, and the vestments of the priests were elaborate and evidently costly. The singing was similar to that in vogue in the early ages. The tones were nasal, and the chanting of a weird Gregorian type.

Dr. Derounian's address was in the Armenian language, and he said in substance: "The Armenians who at the hands of the Turks lost their lives and homes, and whose wives and daughters were submitted to outrages worse than death, died for the salvation of their country and their fellow-men, as Christ died for the salvation of the world. Such an incident in the nineteenth century is a disgrace to the civilized nations of the world, who should take prompt measures to punish the assassins and prevent any repetition of such a massacre. As surely as God rules the universe, the Armenian tragedies will be avenged. I sincerely trust," he said in conclusion, "that this country may never see such dreadful scenes as any country has."
