CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 7.—President Cleveland has cabled that he has reconsidered his decision not to send an American with the Turkish Commission appointed to inquire into the Armenian outrages, and that he will allow the American Legation here to nominate a delegate.

asked to send a delegate with the Armenian Commission, but declined. The British Foreign Secretary immediately upon invitation nominated a delegate. It is officially explained that the difficulty in Armenia originated in an insurrection in Sassoun, in which the Turkish troops were repulsed with a number killed. The Turkish authorities do not believe that the regular soldiery sent to put down the uprising committed the excesses they are accused of, though it is probable that in the operations against the rebellious villages many people were killed.
