

ARMENIANS IN TURKEY.

The Sultan Permits Them To Hold a Ball
at Constantinople in Aid of
Their Schools.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 3, 1895.—Permission has been given by the authorities for the holding in this city this year of an Armenian ball in aid of the Armenian schools. This ball was formerly an annual affair, but in recent years it has been prohibited.

NEW YORK ARMENIANS PROTEST.

A meeting was held in the North Presbyterian Church, at Thirty-first street and Ninth avenue, last night to protest against the Armenian outrages. Dr. S. B. Rossiter, pastor of the church, presided. Addresses were made by Dr. I. Ishkanian and Dr. M. S. Gabriel, editor of the Haik, an Armenian paper. Rev. Dr. Peter Stryker, of the Thirty-fourth Street Reformed Church, occupied a seat on the platform and read a set of resolutions expressing sympathy for Armenia.

Dr. Ishkanian spoke about the past history of Armenia. He was followed by Dr. Gabriel, whose subject was the "Present Condition of Armenia, and What Europe and America Should Do for Her." He said:—"The United States need not officially meddle between Turkey and Armenia, but it can unofficially urge England to protect Armenians and to enforce the Berlin treaty. The moral influence of the United States in favor of Armenia will be greatly felt in Europe."
