

ARMENIA MAY UPSET EUROPE.

London Journal Calls Gladstone a "Grand Old Mischief Maker."

LONDON, Dec. 31.—Commenting upon Mr. Gladstone's speech Saturday to a deputation of Armenians, the St. James's Gazette calls him a "Grand Old Mischief-Maker."

In an article headed: "Should Gladstone Be Muzzled?" the Pall Mall Gazette says:

"The question does not affect a handful of Armenians only, but it easily involves the peace of Europe. The foreign powers do not understand Mr. Gladstone as we do. They see in him a still possible premier, and his unbridled words will infinitely increase the difficulties."
