

RUSTEM PASHA DID NOT CRY.

He Denies, as Others Doubted, Authenticity of an Alleged Letter.

LONDON, Sept. 5.—Rustem Pasha, Turkish Ambassador to Great Britain, authorizes an absolute denial of The Post's Paris dispatch embodying a letter purporting to have been written by Rustem Pasha to the Foreign Minister in Constantinople, giving an account of an interview he had with Lord Salisbury. The Turkish Ambassador says the whole dispatch is a baseless invention.

The Westminster Gazette, in an article on the most recent developments of the Armenian situation, declares that it will need further evidence of the authenticity of the Paris dispatch published in The Post giving what purports to be the text of a dispatch sent by Rustem Pasha, the Turkish Ambassador to Great Britain, to the Foreign Office at Constantinople, embodying the report of an interview with Lord Salisbury, before it can believe the alleged utterances possible.

The Pall Mall Gazette makes no comments on the matter.
