Turkish Gendarmes Break Into the Abode of Foreign Envoys at Moosh.

THRUST OUT WITH DIFFICULTY.

Shooting of Consular Officials by Bedouins Lends Importance to the Moosh Affair.

BRITISH WARSHIPS SENT TO JIDDAH.

Arabs Attacked the Christians
While Out Walking and Without Provocation.

vices from Moosh report that the residence occupied by the French, British and Russian Envoys there was forcibly entered by Turkish gendarmes, who tried to arrest a servant, used abusive language and were expelled with difficulty.

This occurrence, coupled with the Jiddah incident, has caused considerable

excitement in diplomatic circles.

The Russian, French and British Ambassadors have made representations to the Turkish Government demanding prompt punishment of the gendarmes.

Three British warships have been ordered to Jiddah to protect foreigners and investigate the killing of the British Vice-Consul and the wounding of other consular officers.

JIDDAH, Arabia, May 31.—The following particulars have been obtained of the assassination of the British Vice-Consul here yesterday and the wounding of other foreign Consular officers.

W. S. Richardson, the British Consul; the British Vice-Consul; Mr. Brandt, the Russian Consul, and M. d'Orville, the Secretary of the French Consulate, were taking a walk near town, when, apparently without provocation, they were attacked by eight Bedouin Arabs, who opened fire upon them with guns and pistols at a distance of only four yards.

The British Vice-Consul was so badly wounded he died in ten minutes. While he lay wounded on the ground the Bedouins continued to fire upon him and also stabbed him with knives.

Mr. Richardson and M. d'Orville were badly wounded. Mr. Brandt's jaw was broken and his nose was shot away. All may die.

Fifteen arrests have been made. The greatest excitement prevails here, intensified because several British warships are expected to inquire into the outrage and insist upon the punishment of the offenders.

LONDON, June 1, 4 A. M.—The Daily News, commenting upon tae recent incidents at Jiddah, Moush and Bayrout, says:

It is not too much to say that there are many signs of a holy war against all Christian communities and all Christian rights whatsoever in the Turkish empire. The powers represented on the Armenian commission cannot possibly mistake its character. Armenia was probably never nearer to complete and final delivery than at this hour.

The Times also comments on the Sultan's delay in accepting the Armenian scheme of reform, and calls him the Great International Micawber.
