GOOD-BY TO BOSTON.

ENDEAVORERS' LAST MEETINGS.

They Send Messages to Queen Victoria and to Cleveland Asking Relief for Armenians.

BOSTON, July 15 .- To-night the fourteenth International Christian Endeavor Convention came to en end. Since last Wednesday more than 500 meetings have been held, and 50,000 delegates have visited this city from other parts of the land and from foreign countries. "Consecration" was the central thought at allthe meetings to-day.

President Clark presided to-night at Mechanics' Hall. Dr. A. B. Grove presented the fol-

lowing resolutions:

"We, the members of the Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor, representing a constituency of nearly 3,000,000, assembled in Boston, Mass., in our fourteenth international annual convention, 50,000 strong, most respectfully address and petition Her Majesty the Queen of England, urging upon her attention the terrible condition of the Christian subjects of Turkey, and praying her in the name of a common faith and an outraged Christian conscience, to use her great in-fluence and authority to help those who are perishing and to give to that country a safe and just government."

The resolutions were carried with a mighty shout from the multitude amid a tumultuous upheaval of a great sea of multi-colored flags

and snowy handkerchiefs. Dr. Grove announced that the same petition would be presented to President Cleveland.

The annual convention sermon was delivered by the Rev. H. M. Wharton, D. D., of Baltl more. His subject was "Consecration."
