Loyal Turks Celebrate in New York Anniversary of the Popular Sultan of Turkey.

His Imperial Majesty Abdul Hamis Sultan of Turkey had an anniversar yesterday. This is why the editors Kawkab America (Star of America), D A. J. Arbeely and N. Arbeely, gave reception in his honor last night in the sanctum at No. 45 Pearl street.

And such a reception! There were 4 or 500 persons present on the top floo of that dingy old building; the me wore red fezzes; red silk Turkish flag with the white star and crescent wer everywhere; there were Turkish por tieres and Turkish divans, Turkish mu and Turkish speeches, Turkis cigarettes and Turkish coffee, and roly poly Turkish children rolling about th floor.

"This reception," said Mr. Arbeely "is a tribute to the personal characte and magnanimity of the Sultan and t his enlightenment and tolerance as ruler. Most of those present are Chris tians of the orthodox Greek and Maron ite churches, but there are some Mo hammedans. We have people here to night from Persia, Syria, Egypt, Greece

Tunis, Tripoli, Morocco, Zanzibar and Palestine, all in their native costumes "We have Asim Bey, the Turkish Consul-General, of New York, and we

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expect His Excellency, Mavroyeni Bey the Turkish Ambassador at Washing ton. We have also all the Turkish merchants and importers of silks and rugs and all the prominent ladies of

the Turkish colony in this city. "The entertainment? Well, there

be addresses in French, English Turkish by the Consul-General an others. Several poems in Arabic wil ant also be read. My brother, Dr. Arbeely has written a poem dedicated to the Sultan, which will be sung. At the end there will be Turkish fireworks, and everybody will stand up and sing the Turkish national hymn."

Mr. Arbeely said that a cable message would be sent to the Sultan, telling him about it. Then he ordered refreshments which were prepared by the former cher of Ismail Pasha, the Khedive of Egypt

who was at the World's Fair.
