## The Sitantion as Vleved by an Edu-

 cated arid Well-Kmovin Importer.The reports by cable of the massace of helpless Armenians in Turkey by Turkish soldiers have been freely discussed in business circles and there ha. been a marked disposition to regard the reports as somewhat sensational.

With a view of obtaining some rellable information on the probable extent of the outrages a representative of this Journal called upon a prominent importer of oriental rugs and carpets-an Armenian by birth. At his request his name is not mentioned as he feared the Turks might take revenge of his parents and relatives. He has been in this country for six years and is a graduate of the American College at Marsouan, which was burned by the Tunks a year and a half age. He seta:
"I am quite certain that the cable reports are not exagiserated and I am not surprised for we all saw the massacre coming on the unhappy duy ubout three jeaps ago when the sultan eommenced to Arm the mountaineer Kurdish and Cireassian tribes with modern arms. At the same time the houses of Armínians were raided without the silfhtest fugtheatien. There are no mailroals in Asta Minow (Armenfa). Thousands of offers have been made to the Turkish government by Armenians, Americans, French, English and Germans, but all have heen rojected, No Buropeans live in Armenia for businegs for the reqeon that they do nos like to traver on rough roads on horse o donkey back. This EgCuaintcd with the Christian Armentank."
"How is IL, if Europeant will not and cannot live in Armenia, that American misslontaries live there?" the roporter asked.
"That is a different matter," the importer replied. "You will not find one American living in Asia Minor for business, but for religion many people are willing to sacrifice their prowerly and endanger their families and their own Ifves. It is a fact that American missionaries are in -4s much constant fear of getting rafded and robbed by Turks as are Armenians, and, indeed, are raided and rohhed very frequently."
"Are your neighbors in Syrla mare comfortable than the Armeniank?"
"Certainly, but they have had their share of murders, pllages, ete., at the hands of the Turks. They are now comfomtable be cause they are under the protection of France. Jncland has the rewmonslbility of reforms in Armenia and of the protection of Chriatians there. But there have been no reforms in frmonja; Engiand han foyth
 Lians. By tho Berlin Ireaty of Thi\% she was to protect and reform the country. But when complaint was made by the Armenfans 10 England the Turks made them sign papers that they were comfortable if they did not sign they would be killed. The Turks are encouraged by the negleet of England. We ask the citizens of the United States not to take up arms against 'Turkey, hut we ask them as a nution represent ing the laws of liberty to give their unfortunate Christian brethren in Armenia their moral support. Let them induce President Cleveland to send i mote to the Europeati powers that the unforturnate peonle tTP suffering. It would cost nothing and might save thousands who might otherwise be massacred.
"We have not the sllehtest confidence in the report that the Sultan has appointed several Mahomedan Turks, "pashas, ete., to investigate the matter. We beg the European powers to pay no attention to Turkish falveties.
"The Armenlans are the life of Turkey. They control the commerce and are essentially a commercial people."
