Relentless Police of Constantinople Kill Scores.

APMENIANS FLY TO THE CHURCHES.

An Attack in a Cafe and Twenty
Victims Left Dead.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 3.—Turmoll, rioting, carnage reign to-night in all the fury

of maddened beings relentlessly harassed by

the police.

Residents are terror-stricken. It is worth as much as a man's life to venture out where chance bullets may bring death at every turn.

The uproar has intensified since the out-

breaks of Monday night.

The carnage is frightful in the Stamboul

The carnage is frightful in the Stamboul quarter of town.

Last evening every Armenian caught on the streets was pursued by the Softas and at-

tacked.

Fifty unfortunates gave up their lives in

the night.

The police also descended upon a cafe in which there were twenty Armenians. A

fight for life followed.

When the smoke and dust had cleared above the wreck and ruin in the place, the bodies of every one of the twenty Armenians were stretched on the floor, dead, with the

crimson life fluid, that flowed from ghastly wounds, staining the wood.

The fugitive Armenians are flying to the

churches for relief and safety.

The clergy are untiring in their efforts to

reassure them, and address the frightened Armenians almost continuously.

The conduct of the Armenians in going armed to take part in the demonstration in front of the gates of the palace on Monday is generally condemned, and no doubt is now entertained that the rioting originated in an organized movement on the part of the

Armenian Revolutionary Committee.

The revolvers and knives taken from dead or living Armenians by the police were all of

or living Armenians by the police were all of the same pattern.

Members of the other religious denominations fear that the fanaticism of the Turks may extend in other directions. The Armenians have the sympathy of foreigners, but the fact that they are armed lends color to the statements of the Turkish officials that the attempt to present a petition to the Grand Vizier on Monday, which led to the first bloodshed, was a pretext which was to

serve as a signal for an Armenian outbreak.
