

AGITATION IN ROUMANIA.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE HERALD:—

In the HERALD of the 13th you write that the Armenians have emissaries in Roumania holding meetings to incite the people in favor of their cause.

I have just received news from Bucharest, which says "that the government has decided to expel the Armenian agitators."

Having taken the pen to write on the Armenian question, I, a Roumanian—i. e., from a country which has only recently acquired her liberty from Turkish sovereignty—cannot be accused of taking their part.

There are in Roumania about two thousand Armenians, who are nearly all engaged in commercial pursuits—some as pedlars, some as grain merchants, &c.
